





ANNUAL REPORT JULY 2024 - JUNE 2025



FROM OUR CEO

In my last annual report, I stated that we as an organisation had begun a long battle to remain part of the Perth landscape, had many challenges to review programs and processes to remain a viable entity into the future. In 2024/5 we have certainly begun to meet these challenges head on. In my 8th year my role has now been split to not only look after the day to day running of the centre but also to now include strategy and design planning for our eventual move of premises. Post the Feb 25 announcement by the WA Premier that the Government would support our move to a new premises to the tune of \$10.6 million we are now all systems go on the move and a fair majority of my time and that of our President, Xander van Beusekom, is now spent working with officials from the Dep't of Health and Dep't of Finance & Infrastructure on moving through the design process from conceptual last year to schematic design this year and final design and budget by the end of 2025. From this shall hopefully come a new premisses with updated office, kitchen, meeting and toilet facilities, 28 day stables, 22 large yards with shelters, a new covered 70 x 30 arena, an outdoor 60 x 20 arena, a pony paddock and a horse paddock. All in a design that is both human and horse friendly and makes the most of the available space and will provide us with a workable facility for many years to come. Moving through this process we are already aware of probable budget constraints and that some portions of the development may come back to us to fund their completion and that some specs of the build may have to change due to budget constraints. A fine balancing act will be a constant of the next 12 months.

Our current lease has been extended until we are ready to move which is currently forecast for 2027 which gives us security of tenure for the time being. The downside of this plan is that we are not looking to upgrade any of current facilities and are basically now in a "active maintenance" role of all current facilities and fingers crossed the rapidly aging facilities remain workable until we move.

In the past year we have continued our partnership with the OTT (program of RAWWA) we have 5 sponsored OTT horses in training and they also supported us in the maintenance program of the stable yard with the installation of dividing rubber and continued Murdoch dental program for our OTT and other horses. We continue our own Sponsor a Horse program which has expanded from 12 to now 24 sponsored at the end of June which is a very pleasing result.

With the ageing population of our school horses and the unfortunate loss of favourites Arnold and Oscar this past year we are always on the lookout for suitable replacements and whilst a couple of younger big horses were purchased this year for the future the need for ponies especially who can come straight into the school is foremost in our searching. Whilst our future planning energies are directed to moving to the new site, we continue to be under pressure to provide more services on our current site. Our current waitlist totals remain over 200 for our 3.30pm integrated beginners group, 37 able riders and 133 riders with a disability. With these numbers in mind, we have introduced supervised volunteering for clients with a disability on our waitlist and also now suggest "pat & groom" visits to clients on our waitlists as well. As a Board we have also looked at expanding our centre program to include an on the ground training program as a way to encompass a changing clientele and to relive pressure on the current waitlist and I believe this is an inevitable and logical addition to our current program offering.

FROM OUR CEO

On the work front we were very fortunate to have had "Scottish Kirsty" as a casual instructor that relieved the pressure on M'liss and is super help to Alex in the yard. We have also added casual afternoon stable hands to help keep the flow of the afternoon lessons. Continuing pressure on our riding numbers and having the ability to take on new riders is an important challenge that we carry into our remaining time on our current site and into the new site. This year we also farewelled Dominique Jauffrett as our Friday instructor and thank Dom for her many years of service and wish her a long and happy retirement "down south". We now welcome Cindy Black into the Friday role and we continue to search for an additional permanent coach to join the team.

In February of 25 we were delighted and proud that M'liss once again had been nominated for a State award – this time Community Citizen of the Year.

In our extra-curricular activities, we also saw our Pony Club members complete a range of activities including Rallies, PC National Video Dressage Competition and an outing to Perth Horse & PC Show where they competed in Hacking, Jumping and Dressage. We look forward to completing another round of Pony Club certificates later this year.

On the back of SO Equestrian activities being placed into suspension for the 12 months our riders have been integrated into the Pony Club program and in recent months there have been mutterings from SO National that there is a possibility that the sport will be reinstated in time for the 2026 Nationals. On to our annual WADSA Gymkhana in November where we invite our clients and their families to come along and take part in 5 pre-set individual games set up in the Indoor. This is always a great community event and it's lovely to see family members watching their relative ride, maybe have a go themselves and then all get together to enjoy a BBQ lunch. Our able clients are our volunteers for the day and get just as much out of the day as the clients do.

You will see from the Treasurers Report that we made a small profit this year by a raise again in Able fees, our spending/expenses were down and again our camps were strong. With a small decline in NDIS riders, we have seen a \$20,000 decline in NDIS income. Our small profit this year was also bolstered by the introduction of a new Annual Admin Fee of \$125 for all clients saw an additional \$12,000 in income which helped towards our \$19,000 surplus.

In 24/5 Tonia Bates continued in a voluntary capacity as Volunteer Coordinator and my assistant as well helping in all admin areas in the office. Our core group of volunteers are a fantastic asset and fabulous to know they will be there week after week as unfortunately new Volunteers are not as reliable. Like our clients it is a growing area within CTRC and we are currently receiving just as many volunteer enquiries as we are riding. Turning these enquiries into actual applications and then inductions and then a weekly roster seems to be a challenge. This year we processed paperwork for 37 new volunteers of which only 9 remain with us. An obvious area that we need to work on when we rely upon up to 60 volunteers to show up each week. Volunteers come from many walks of life including retirees, uni students, schoolwork experience, special ed students, semi retirees, teenagers, etc. The hardest part is that Volunteers, unlike employees, think that it's not a problem to not show up which can make it difficult for our teams on a daily basis.

We move into 25/26 year busier than ever with the same enthusiasm and commitment to all our clients and their riding goals as we have had in years gone by but added to the forefront of work in the year ahead once again will be our move to the new premisses, the search for more staff, horses and the possibility of introduction of new innovative on the ground program that is complimentary and not invasive of our current riding program to help relieve our waitlist and bring in more income to the centre.

For me personally a huge thanks to M'liss and Alex for putting up with my ideas and timetabling of clients. To our

additional coaches, Cindy, Dom & Kirsty, as well as our afternoon stable hands, Eloise, Hayley and Lily, a very big thank you. And to all our valued Volunteers – we certainly can't do what we do without you all.

Lastly to our very supportive Board we look forward to conquering the challenges that lie ahead of us in the coming year.

FROM OUR PRESIDENT

After years of uncertainty, I can now honestly say that there is serious progress in regards of our move across the road.

But let me go back to the end of 2024 when there was still a lot of uncertainty who would pay for the move. It was great to hear that in February 2025 the Labor Government included the relocation cost in their election promise. And after their election success, they did not wait to push the project forward!

By April 2025 we had the first meeting with Cox Architects that took the existing Master Plan and started working through the details, making sure that the overall idea would actually work and be in line with all legislation. It was good to see that not much had to be changed from the original Master Plan.

Moving on from the Master Plan also meant that we were not just looking at the layout of the new place, but also the materials including Arena Base and stable types. To be able to provide detailed input in the design, M'liss, Hannah, Jacqui and myself took a trip into the Swan Valley to look at various options. All our inputs were incorporated in the Schematic Design that we received for review in July. Other topics that were looked at were existing (buried) infrastructure, bushfire risk, arboricultural survey, fire risk, design requirements and legislation, retic, water connections and so much more.

The architect is now working on the final tweaks on the detailed design drawings. A small window into the new look of our entrance/office/kitchen/mounting block (AKA The Hub) is provided in the image below.

At the moment we are still on schedule to start construction mid 2026, with the move expected to be complete Q1/Q2 2027.

I can also report that the Lease of our current site has been extended until the end of 2027 and we are already working on the lease of the new premise.

It was also time this year to review and update our Policies and Procedures, to make sure we are still compliant with regulations. Many thanks to Beth Marchbank who went through all our procedures. We are currently working on the final updates, and we should be good for the next few years.

I would like to thank M'liss, Jacqui, Hannah, Tonia, Cindy, Kirsty and all the volunteers at the Centre for their endless support and enthusiasm in keeping the Centre going! And of course, also all the Board Members who work behind the scenes to keep the Centre on track.

ABOUT CTRC

Claremont Therapeutic Riding Centre (CTRC) provides horse riding for therapy, sport, recreation and training for children and adults of all abilities. With a focus on inclusion and participation, CTRC is striving to provide the best facilities, horses and well trained staff possible. Riders with disabilities recieve world class riding tuition and therapy at a highly subsidised rate.

Established in 1972, 20 years later, on November 2, 1992 the Centre became incorporated and known as the Claremont Therapeutic Riding Centre Inc. It is the longest running organisation in WA providing riding for people with disabilities.

Lessons provide both therapy and learning experience for the participating riders (psychologically as well as physically). Our qualified coaches (Equestrian Australia, AHRC, CTRC Accredited) are trained to work with a wide variety of disabilities: cerebral palsy, autism, hearing, vision and intellectual impariment, multiple sclerosis, acquired brain injury and paraplegia.

Quality of life is improved by participation in a sporting activity that provides therapeutic and recreational benefits that are both mentally and physically stimulating; it allows people with disabilities to be active participants, not just observers. Social contact and involvement with the community is an important aspect of our Centre.

Once participants have reached an accepted standard, we endeavour to integrate our riders into other equestrian environments such as pony clubs, adult riding clubs, trail riding, dressage competitions and ultimately Para and Special Olympics. Two of our riders have since competed in the 2015 & the 2019 Special Olympics.

Such is the Centre's work with people with disabilties that in 1992, the Centre won the Community Event of the Year in the Australia Day awards. The Centre's Head Coach, M'liss Henry, was awarded Citizen of the Year for her efforts in the specialised field, an Order of Australia medal in 2008 and was inducted into the WA Women's Hall of Fame in 2019.























































2024-25 FINANCIAL REPORT

CTRC Treasurer's Report for the period 01/07/2024 to 30/6/2025

This year proved to be a profitable one as our surplus of \$19,805 increased by \$9,382 from the previous year. This was an excellent result given that in the previous year we received a one-off donation of \$45,000. This increase in surplus was mainly a result of a decrease in our cost of sales.

The surplus was after a non-cash expense of \$11,638 was allowed for Depreciation.

Income for the year actually decreased to \$533,290 compared to \$547,426 in the previous period. As previously noted, there was a one-off donation of \$45,000 in the previous period. There was an excellent increase in Able Fees of \$45,180. We also benefited from the new annual fee payable by riders which totalled \$12,500. Fees from Day Camps and Agistment also improved however our fees from NDIS Disabled and Donations fell.

Our Cost of Sales of maintaining direct expenses with the horses fell quite significantly by \$24,802. Whilst the cost of horse feed was up by \$8,710, farrier and vet costs were down by \$3,677 and \$11,691 respectively. We also only purchased additional horses to the value of \$15,272 compared to \$30,029 the previous year.

Other expenditure was in line with last year, even though our total employment costs increased by \$8,574. We had an increase in casual wages of \$25,402 to provide additional staff to assist M'liss and Alex in preparation of the riding lessons. This increase was offset in that we had provided \$13,850 for Long Service Leave benefits for our employed staff in the previous period.

Insurance premiums decreased by \$4,141, Donations and sponsorship by \$5,155 (we had a once of cost last year of \$6,000 to a consultant to prepare a business plan). Motor Vehicle costs increased by \$4,444 as we had significant services to some of the vehicles.

Our cash on hand sits at a very healthy \$523,830 and out net worth is \$346,924. Given our future move to new premises cash will be needed to refurnish and meet other costs.

We have budgeted for a surplus of \$11,502 for this financial year.
